Academic Senate President's Letter

The CCCD Chancellor's office recommended to the Board the hiring of faculty this fall via the filling of vacancies only. Though the Board has yet to approve this recommendation, for Coastline College this means the replacement of one retiree from late last spring. On November 5th, during the normal Academic Senate hours of 12:30-2:30 pm, we will have prioritization of this position. Though the final number of presenters is not yet set, it looks like about 7-8 disciplines will vie for the coveted single position and the high hopes that whoever is hired will promote both the program and the Mission of Coastline; participate in governance; and, most of all, be that teacher we all wish we had teaching that special course we need. We will be voting electronically for the first time, both for the convenience of tracking and counting and to sustain this year's endeavor to go green and do our small part for planet Earth.

In the efforts to promote our own health and wellness, we have asked the College Council to help the four campuses develop small health-and-wellness areas for employees. Coastline owns several different types of exercise equipment at the Fairview Developmental Center, which is slated for closure in December. There is enough equipment for a small workout area at each campus and College Center. Sometimes we are motivated to increase our health naturally, but many of us need that extra convenience built in, as it is too easy to say I am tired to go anywhere. I am hopeful that this will help each of us in our efforts to keep a healthy mind and body, especially those of us who spend the majority of the day sitting. Indeed, I have asked Christine Nguyen to add a walking track to the design of the new College Center building. The benefits of a morning, afternoon, or early evening walk will greatly outweigh the nominal costs of the track.

Lastly, all faculty should have received an invite on their Canvas dashboard to the Faculty Resources Canvas site. This site has a calendar of events for faculty, including what is happening at the Faculty Center and a module on all the Academic Senate agendas, minutes and handouts (which also will eventually go on the webpage); important information such as committee assignments; chairs of departments; ways to submit grades and how to apply for professional development funds. 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Coastline College Great Shakeout Exercise

Every year on the third Thursday of October, Californians (and now the rest of the nation) prepare for the catastrophic earthquake that we all know will come in California. On 10/14/19 at 10:33 pm, as people were preparing for bed, a 4.5 magnitude earthquake occurred 1-mile Southeast of Pleasant Hill, Contra Costa County in Northern California. The earthquake was widely felt across the Bay Area. The following day at 11:42 am, a 5.0 magnitude earthquake in Central California south of Sacramento.

This year, the Great Shakeout took place on October 17th at 10:17 am (10/17 at 10:17) at Coastline College’s Student Services Center. To avoid disrupting mid-term examinations, the other campuses exercised at different times the following week. The exercise serves multiple purposes. The most obvious is to remind everyone of the threat of earthquakes and of what to do if you are ever caught in one; Drop, Cover, and Hold On. It also provides an opportunity to practice evacuating the building, not taking the elevators, and reminds everyone where the designated, safe assembly areas are located. Do you know the area for your campus? Additionally, it is an opportunity for the Public Safety and Emergency Management Department to test some of its safety systems such as our Regroup Emergency Notification System and our Public Address System. All four of the exercises were executed as planned, and all emergency systems (Regroup ENS), the P.A. System, Fire Doors, and Fire Alarm systems operated as designed.

Not only is it important for us to be prepared here at work, but it is also important for you and your loved ones to be prepared at home and on the road for any emergency. You can learn how to prepare for an earthquake or any emergency by visiting www.shakeout.org.

You just won a trip around the world... congratulations. Here is the catch...You have to use at least three different modes of transportation, and you can only visit five cities. How are you getting there and where are they?



I absolutely love traveling and have visited over 20 countries in North and South America, Africa, and Asia; however, I haven't been to many places in Africa. I would probably visit Iceland to see the northern lights, then fly to Amsterdam since it's one of the top-rated child friendly cities in the world, cruise to Morocco (I know it's a country, not a city), maybe drive down to Kenya for a safari, then continue to South Africa and New Zealand, and end it in Palawan in the Philippines.

Do you have a favorite painting or artist?

I always loved Monet; his art is just so soft and dreamy; some of my favorite works are his water lilies collection.

You get to have dinner with a historical person, alive or dead... Who would it be and what is on the menu?

There are many inspiring people I would like to meet such as the ones involved in making change in the world and spreading peace like Dalai Lama or Nelson Mandela, but these are typical answers, I'd have to say; after all, they did win the Nobel Peace Prize. I'd also like to meet Hitler, not because I admire what he did, but just to understand how someone could do such things. The people I find really inspiring are the ones who have done the unexpected, especially when people expected them to fail because they had a disability, such as Frida Kahlo who suffered from polio and is known for her saying (and, obviously, her art) "Feet, what do I need you for when I have wings to fly?" I have personally been a burn survivor from a hot air balloon accident in Temecula that resulted in completely losing range of motion in both hands when I was also on my last year of the PhD program. My program director expected me to take time off but listening to all the inspiring people who didn't give up or let a disability stop them from accomplishing their goals helped me reach my goal and defend my research the same day of my accident the following year, and I also gained full range of motion in both hands after many surgeries and therapy.

Fear: In The Sky - Nom De Guerre

This exhibition has been organized under the co-op curatorial banner of Nom De Guerre. "Fear: In The Sky" is about the omnipresent "eye in the sky," big brother-like technologies that have irrevocably changed our world since the advent of aviation and its resulting race into space. Our aerial veil has been penetrated, and what we once considered private space is now gone—we can run, but we can no longer hide and that is the crux of this show's premise. We are being watched, recorded, and objectified, all in the name of security and/or commerce. Who would have thought before the advent of cell phone technology— that we would have willingly allowed corporate and/or government entities to implant chips that would track our every move? but, of course, that is what satellites and cell towers have done. We believe that since the inception of aviation too few artists have spoken out about the consequences of this indiscriminate hell raining down upon humanity. The exhibition runs from September 5, 2019, to October 19, 2019, at the West Los Angeles College Art Gallery, located at 9000 Overland Avenue, Culver City, 90212.


Jeanne Oelstrom was busy dog-sitting Lucy, a coton-de-tulear.

Josh Levenshus is moving to Catalina, correction his computer is moving over to Catalina.




Deborah flew to Houston to visit her 93 year old mom, as it looked like I wasn't go to make it to visit in November. Here we just finished Bingo. She won twice.



David headed on over to Early College High School to get Matt Quinlan's Psyc class to participate in the Student Art show, this **December 10 @5pm**




Lisa was drinking green tea, wearing bathrobe, listening to the music, and enjoyed discussions with students online at her home computer.
