In reviewing the 'fully met percentage of students', I was struck by the 80% statistic. My impression was that was quite a bit lower than I expected (closer to 100% than 80%). I then realized that only 41 of the 47 registered students completed assessments (participation in discussion forums, collaborative workshops, quizzes for each chapter, a mid-term and final exam, and a written paper) past about week 4 (out of 16). That means that the measurement of achievement by students compared the achievements of the actual group, to an 'ostensible' (because they registered, and didn't withdraw or drop) group size 14.6% (6/41) greater than actual. If the proportion ratio is 41:47::80%X%, then X=91.7% of the participants fully meeting the SLO. I'm not whining; just observing. We will never have more students that take and complete the course, than have registered. (which would inflate the achievement rate). We will, however, always be subjected to being measured against the 'total registered', which in my experience, always includes one or more students who just quit enroute, without taking their names out of the registration list. Ergo, the stats will always show a lower than actual performance ratio.
