For this SLO, I primarily used the final exam (70%) and the term paper (20%) in testing this. Overall, I'm relatively happy with these results. One reason for 29% of students failing is because many didn't do the assignments. Out of the 12 students who failed, 4 of them did not take the final exam. And there were an additional 3 students who failed to turn in the term paper. Thus, these students skewed the results more than what they would be.

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Overall, I'm relatively happy with these results. For this SLO, 70% was assigned towards the term paper. One reason why 27% of the class failed in this assessment is because 7 out of the 13 students who failed did not turn in the term paper. And of these, 3 students stopped showing up to class altogether. There really was no excuse not to turn in the paper. I gave over two months to complete this assignment and provided many resources to help them succeed. However, 15% of this SLO was assigned towards extra credit (that being participation in class and via discussion board forums). Given that participation is not required in this class, many chose not to participate. This can be another reason why these results show 27% of students failing. For next semester, I will readjust the SLO weights to avoid this.

In the Spring 2013 semester, given it is a 16 week course, I will be using the city council/letter to representative assignment to test for this SLO.
