Analysis of Progress on 5-year Goals

Analysis of (One-Year Goals): Progress on EM/HS program goals has been excellent. 1) We completed the associate's degree level requirements for the CSU-CEMHS new statewide initiative and are awaiting statewide approval. 2) The CTE Division presented an instructor development workshop in October 2013 and two EM/HS instructors received additional training. 3) The TSA program is fully implemented and students are scheduled for graduation in May 2014. 4) The EM/HS Department Chair is conducting faculty evaluations and faculty contacts to increase academic rigor in course offerings. 5) The Department Chair received a 1-unit increase in LHE. 6) College officials are back working to update state approval for the department EM/HS degree. 7) Criminal justice course SLO's were approved in Fall 2013.
