

SUCCESS IN A SNAPSHOT

2015/2016 Highlights

40 YEARS OF EDUCATION

Paying tribute to Coastline's 40th Anniversary, a special gala was held on April 23, 2016 to celebrate Coastline's achievements through the years. We honored 40 years of education while giving a nod to our past, present, and future with the recognition of former presidents, Dr. Bernie Luskin, Dr. John Buller, Dr. Bill Vega, Dr. Leslie Purdy, and Dr. Ding-Jo Currie. The celebration had more than 300 attendees, many who dressed in 70's attire in honor of the year Coastline was founded, and danced to music provided by 70's cover band, "The Funky Hippeez." Gala sponsorships, ticket sales, and silent auction generated \$74,000 in income. We thank all who were in attendance for their support.

#1 COMMUNITY COLLEGE IN THE U.S.

In the later part of 2015, the Huffington Post reported that "a college education is increasingly important to obtain and keep a job in the world today and that community colleges serve as excellent options for students desiring to further their education at an affordable price." Although it was not breaking news for Coastliners, Coastline Community College was proud to gain the attention of Huffington Post and their readers by ranking #1 amongst the list of the nation's top ten community colleges in the country, offering a low-cost education, good return on investment, and high success rate.

INCREASED DEGREES AND CERTIFICATES AWARDED

The number of degrees and certificates awarded by Coastline Community College reached an exponential increase this academic year. In comparison to 2012/2013 figures, Coastline experienced a 145.9% increase in overall degrees awarded and a 149% increase in overall certificates awarded. These numbers demonstrate that Coastline students are making it to the finish line, completing the next step on their path toward further education, and securing gainful employment in the workforce.

CYBERSECURITY PROGRAM DEEMED EXCELLENT BY DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY

Coastline received a distinct honor this academic year and was named as the fourth school in the nation designated as a National Center of Academic Excellence in Information Assurance/Cybersecurity for two-year institutions through the academic year 2019, by the National Security Agency and the Department of Homeland Security. This designation represents leading institutions that provide leadership in Cybersecurity issues, curriculum, and practice. This recognition reaffirms our commitment to innovative education and our continual efforts to provide students with stimulating programs that serve as a competitive edge on the workforce.

VOTED "BEST FOR VETS" BY MILITARY TIMES

In 2016, Coastline Community College received the "Best for Vets" recognition from the Military Times. This recognition highlights the innovative approaches higher education institutions take to help student veterans succeed in class while shouldering other responsibilities. Colleges were evaluated by a rigorous-120-question survey as well as information pulled from the Veterans Affairs Department, Defense Department, and three Education Department databases for figures on everything from veteran-related policies to average salaries after graduation. Coastline remains committed to serving the greatest needs of our veteran student population.

20TH LOS ANGELES-AREA EMMY® AWARDED

Coast Learning Systems (a division of Coastline), located just south of Hollywood, has enjoyed its fair share of stardom because of our stellar educational programming, production, and instructional excellence over the past 40 years. This year, Coastline Community College received its 20th Emmy® award allotted by the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences during the 67th annual Los Angeles Area Emmy® Awards. The L.A. Area Emmys® are awarded to celebrate the achievements of select broadcasts produced in the greater L. A. region. Coastline won in the "Best Instructional Programming" category for our series entitled "Physical Geology across the American Landscape."

SUCCESS IN A SNAPSHOT

CANVAS LEARNING MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

In the spirit of innovation, Coastline Community College launched and fully migrated a new learning management platform purposed to engage students in a learning environment that values open access to high-quality information, content, data, and resources, as well as ensures regular, substantive interaction and feedback between faculty and students. Coastline staff and faculty trained intensely during the year in preparation for full utilization of the Canvas system beginning Fall Semester 2016. Coastline is the first college in the Coast Community College District to launch and fully migrate to Canvas.

INAUGURAL YEAR OF THE FACULTY SUCCESS CENTER

The Faculty Success Center (FSC) was opened this year to provide leadership and support for faculty innovation in teaching and learning including improving course quality. The FSC promotes faculty collaboration, inquiry, and sharing of best practices. The Center also provides design, technical, and pedagogical support to faculty while developing courses. This faculty-driven initiative was led during its inaugural year by a team comprised of Dr. Dan Johnson, Professor Rick Lockwood, Professor Cheryl Chapman, and Sylvia Amitoelau.

STAR 2.0

The Coastline STAR 2.0 Program is a guided pathways program intentionally designed to help students stay on track to achieve their goals of transferring to a university in 4 semesters. Throughout the program, students have access to wrap-around services such as Financial Aid, Counseling, and other support services to help with retention and success. Courses for participants are grouped together based on content and compatibility to help students according to their goals. Participation in the STAR 2.0 Program has increased from the previous year and is anticipated to grow.

ASIAN PACIFIC ISLANDER INITIATIVE

Coastline is an Asian American Native American Pacific Islander Serving Institution (AANAPISI). This year, we were awarded a \$2 million Title III Grant entitled the "New Asian American Pacific Islander Generation Initiative" (NAAPIGI). The grant is a five-year (2015-2020) grant to make Coastline a stronger, more effective college for Asian American and Pacific Islander students. The 2015/2016 school year marked the first implementation year for which NAAPIGI served as a catalyst to organize activities for students and staff, centered on the areas of student engagement, leadership, outreach, and professional development.

LATINO YOUTH CONFERENCE

Coastline was proud to celebrate the 10th annual Latino Youth Conference on April 22, 2016. This event is held annually in partnership with the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) to promote civic leadership among Latino youth and to encourage the pursuit of higher education. LULAC is the oldest and largest Latino civil rights organization in the United States. It is led by Benny Diaz, Compliance Officer, State of California. The Orange County LULAC Foundation advances the economic condition, educational attainment, political influence, health, and civil rights of Hispanic Americans through the provision of community-based programs operating throughout the greater Orange County area. Coastline is a proud partner of LULAC's.

AWARDED GRANT TO CREATE INNOVATIONS IN ONLINE EDUCATION

Coastline received a grant and is serving as the lead college and grant administrator for "ETOPIA." Conceived from a vision of Neil Horikoshi, the CEO of the Asian & Pacific Islander American Scholarship Fund, the grant has been financed by USA Funds. Its primary goal is to create an innovative alliance in online education among federally-designated Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander-Serving Institutions.

SUMMER INSTITUTE

Coastline hosted a 2-day, professional development opportunity promoting innovative, leading-edge practices for teaching and serving students. Guests included Coastline faculty, staff, management, educators from four colleges in the Pacific Islands, and dynamic speakers such as Rahim Rajan from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.



OUR STUDENTS

Students join our Coastline community at a critical time in their lifelong process of growth and change. As they discover

Coastline offers a unique academic experience on-site and online which cultivates curiosity and instills the confidence they need to imagine and shape their vocational path. Coastline students come from all different walks-of-life and because of their unique and varied outlooks—they offer a rich and layered experience to the classroom. They do not simply take in information from their classes and textbooks; they are active inquirers who raise and explore hard questions, apply theory in real-world settings, and seek to improve their lives through continuing education in the form of advanced

degrees, additional certificates, and job experience.

We hope to develop leadership skills in every student, but we would be remiss if we didn't acknowledge the work of Coastline's Associated Student Government (ASG)—our elected and appointed students who serve as the voice of our student population year after year. We truly value the role of student government leaders and rely upon their participation in our shared governance process to represent the needs and ideas of the entire student body. Through various activities, events, and initiatives, the Associated Student Government

makes a difference on each campus and in our online communities. Overall, our students need the support of the entire college to succeed. The Coastline Student Services wing—led by Vice President of Student Services, Ross Miyashiro—plays one of the most integral roles in ensuring that students stay on track toward achieving their academic goals. Admission and Records, Counseling, Assessment & SSSP, Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS), Financial Aid, Student Life and Outreach, and Student Equity all contribute to enhancing the student's customer service experience.

78,720 ENROLLMENT

In 2015/2016, Overall enrollment at Coastline was 78,720. 19.4% of the overall enrollment was associated with the Contract Education/Military Education Program. The overall enrollment has increased by 18.2% since 2012/2013. The majority of enrollment growth occurred in CCC general fund with a 28.2% increase in comparison with 2012/2013.


In 2015/2016, Coastline produced 6,343.43 Full-Time Enrolled Students (FTES). This is 10.6% above Coastline's base allocation, representing an 18.1% increase from 2012/2013.

OUR STAFF

This year's Classified Senate leaders—President Mark Worden and senators—worked particularly hard to increase morale by organizing various events like the Fall Festival, Paints Uncorked, and

Our Classified Senate leaders have worked hard to represent the needs of all classified employees and continue to make professional development a priority, demonstrated by their active participation in programs such as the Coast Community College District-wide Pipeline Leadership Program and the Classified Appreciation and Development Day.

Their charge to help formulate policy on academic and professional matters was met through several initiatives. helped to make sure that nominations were conducted properly for Faculty of the Year Award—a well-deserved honor, that went this year to Fred Feldon, Professor of Mathematics.

Coastline’s Faculty members consistently make student equity, enrollment, and student access a priority, and this year has been no exception. Various resources offered through the FSC ensure that Coastline Faculty has the support, resources, and tools needed to provide the highest quality courses and programs possible for our students.



The Classified Senate works diligently to participate in the decision-making process within the college and throughout the district on issues about operational and professional matters. We value their time and dedication, but most importantly recognize the contributions they make towards the success of the college overall.

Our Management team serves as another segment of our staff who are highly

valued and essential to the services we provide our students. Their charge, to review and improve College operations and management through the sharing of information, discussion, and staff development, is accomplished through their representation on College and District-wide committees. This year, Coastline’s own Rozanne Capoccia-White, served as President of the Coast District Management Association (CDMA), an

organization representing approximately 120 managers throughout the Coast Community College District. The organization is dedicated to advocating for all managers in the District and promotes continued education and professional development during the year. Rozanne’s involvement in CDMA was valuable to the College, and it came as no surprise that her Coastline peers honored her with the 2016 Manager of the Year award.

MILITARY EDUCATION, CORPORATE TRAINING & BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

Coastline's Division of Military Education, Corporate Training & Business Development (MECTBD) focuses on entrepreneurial endeavors that generate revenue for the college through development and delivery of specialized education and training programs and services. Programs include college credit-bearing degrees, certificates, and courses, and workforce training that meets industry needs. Education services range from recruitment and admissions through graduation and program completion. The largest program is the Military Distance Education Program that serves several thousand active duty military, spouses, and veterans worldwide.

GRANTS & CONTRACTS

Transportation Security Administration (TSA)

Coastline was selected to act as the sole educational provider for TSA's Certificate of Achievement program. This online program provides TSA Associates the opportunity to earn the TSA Certificate of Special Achievement leading to a Coastline Certificate and Degree in Emergency Management/Homeland Security.



Kaiser Permanente

Kaiser Permanente's Ben Hudnall Memorial Trust (BHMT) education program began in 2014. This year, eight BHMT Kaiser employees completed their degrees at Coastline, with four graduates attending Coastline's local ceremony.

Safety Technician Career Pathways Apprenticeship Program

This program was designed to prepare individuals for a career as a safety technician in industries, including building/construction, petrochemical, and others.

MILITARY AND VETERANS PROGRAMS

Program Statistics

MECTBD offered courses online, on mobile devices, and onboard ships to students worldwide resulting in 15,335 enrollments. Quality instruction is provided by 82 part-time and 14 full-time Coastline faculty. Services are delivered by dedicated staff located at Coastline's home campus and Military Site Advisors located on or near military installations nationwide.

Navy College Program for Afloat College Education (NCPACE)

Coastline, with partner Central Texas College, was awarded its 3rd consecutive contract with the Department of the Navy to deliver the Navy College Program for

Afloat College Education




Figure 2: 2015/16 NCPACE-Coastline Enrollments by Region

(NCPACE) which provides both academic skills and college courses (undergraduate and graduate) to Sailors and Marines while on sea duty assignments. The original award was in 2004, making this Coastline's 12th year in managing the Distance Learning (DL) component of the program. (See Figure 2: NCPACE-Coastline Enrollments by Region).

Figure 1: 2015/16 Graphic Enrollments by Military Service





Figure 3: 2015/16 Breakdown of Graduates by Classification





Learning 1ST

Learning 1ST is a guided pathway program offering students an opportunity to pursue an Associate degree from Coastline and a Bachelor's degree from a partner university, entirely online. This year, Coastline had its first student graduate earning both an Associate degree at Coastline and a Bachelor's degree in Computer Science from the University of Illinois Springfield, with an additional 29 students successfully transferring to one of our partner universities.

LEARNING 1ST is a guided pathway program offering students an opportunity to pursue an Associate degree from Coastline and a Bachelor's degree from a partner university, entirely online. Cyber Security/Basic Skills Video Game

Funded by a grant from the Orange County Pathways Program (OCPP), Coastline

created a cybersecurity-themed video game designed to assist students with math and English placement test preparation. The cybersecurity theme engages students and encourages them to review and test their knowledge in a fun and exciting way.

CORPORATE TRAINING, BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT & TECHNOLOGY SOLUTIONS

Contract Readiness Grant from California State Chancellor's Office

Funded by a grant from the California Community College's Chancellor's Office, the Contract Readiness Online Training Program (CROTP) offers an affordable, engaging, and easy-to-access curriculum for

developing an understanding of the procurement and contract acquisition process. The program is designed specifically to prepare small-to-medium sized businesses for government, nonprofit and private corporation procurement and contracting activities.

CoastTraining.com

A new web-based platform was developed to create and deliver workforce development training rapidly. This platform incorporates video, audio, and interactivity to provide an engaging and complete learning experience.

National Testing Centers (NTCs)

Coastline Military Programs operates seven NTCs across the United States on US Military bases, serving nearly 4,000 military personnel annually. The NTCs provide Pearson VUE, College Level Examination Program (CLEP), DANTES Subject Standardization Tests (DSST) for accelerating degree completion.

Veterans Resource Centers

The Coastline Community College Veterans Resource Centers (VRC) are located in Fountain Valley and Newport Beach. This year, our VRC provided information and assistance to more than 1,000 veterans and family members.



The mission of the Coastline Community College Foundation is to support students through scholarships, endowment, and other financial programs to expand the capacity to meet the diverse needs of Coastline students and the community.

In 1947, the Orange Coast Junior College District formed. A year later, the District opened its first college, Orange Coast College in Costa Mesa. By 1966, the growing population of the District's 105-mile, eleven-city service area prompted the opening of a second college, Golden West College in Huntington Beach. With the opening of the second college, the District changed its name to the Coast Community College District (CCCCD).

In 1972, CCCD owned and operated the public television station, KOCE-TV (Channel 50), where they were able to broadcast credit courses. As the District population grew, a new student population emerged: the working adult. The ultimate result was the formation of the third college, Coastline Community College! Formed as a college "without walls," Coastline opened the doors in September 1976 and boasted the largest opening day in community


college history (still to this day). Today, Coastline is still known as the leader in innovative education via distance learning, and now has three campuses in Garden Grove, Westminster, and Newport Beach.
