"In California, we have 112 community colleges. We have 2.4 million students going to those 112 community colleges in the state of California. There's a reason for that. It's high quality education and they get the same core subjects and then can have a segue right straight to the university system."

"From my experience, I have found that students that transfer from the community college system into the university college system do better and when I say do better, I'm going to put them in a couple of categories. One they stay longer, meaning many students that start in the University system, for many reasons, not emotional mature enough, not socially mature enough drop out. The big advantage to going to a community college is the fact that they have two years of working with other students, working in small classrooms, learning how to get along, many times staying at home, living with family so that they have formed that social maturity so that when they go on to that university system, the likelihood that they're going to stay in school is extremely high. So they stay there... longer, and another big advantage is the fact that they get better grades because of that same background, so that when they go to the university, they know how to study, they know not to be distracted by some of the things around them and they get better grades."
