What is a PDF and what are the benefits?

- PDF is an abbreviation that stands for Portable Document Format. It's a versatile file format created by Adobe that gives people an easy, reliable way to present and exchange documents - regardless of the software, hardware, or operating systems being used by anyone who views the document. - Adobe
- PDF docs can contain links and buttons, form fields, audio, and video. They can be signed electronically and can easily be viewed on Windows, MacOS, iOS and Android.
- Some benefits of a PDF are; universal compatibility, can secure and protect your data, great for sharing and collaborating, graphic integrity and small file size.

Accessibility Importance of a PDF


- Accessibility is beneficial to all. Access to information is made easier for those with and without impairments because to accessible design.
- Making sure your PDF is accessible will allow your complete audience to interact with and benefit from the material you are developing.
- It is important that we make documents accessible to everyone to provide equal access and equal opportunity to people with disabilities.

Reader, Acrobat, Acrobat Pro?

- Accessibility features in Acrobat and Acrobat Reader fall into two main categories: features that enhance the reading of PDF documents and features to create accessible PDFs. To create accessible PDF documents, use Acrobat, not Reader.
- Acrobat Standard provides some functionality for making existing PDFs accessible. Acrobat Pro enables you to perform tasks, such as editing reading order, or editing document structure tags that are necessary to make some PDF documents and forms accessible.
- For this training we will be using Acrobat Pro.

It's Always Better To Start Off With An Accessible Document!


- Many programs such as Word, InDesign, PowerPoint, Excel and Illustrator can export to PDF.
- Some of these programs can export accessibility information like tags, alt-text, links and reading order to the PDF.
- It's always better to start off with an accessible document!




Accessibility Tool Setup

- Accessibility









Accessibility Menu

Settings to build accessible PDFs

- Autotag Document
 - Automatically detect and add tags to your document.
- Accessibility Check
 - Acrobat checks your document for accessibility errors and gives you a breakdown of your document's accessibility.
- Reading Order
 - The Reading Order tool can help you manually tag your document and edit the reading order.



Accessibility Checker





The **Accessibility Checker** provides breakdown of your document's accessibility issues.



Logical Reading Order and **Color Contrast** will always be listed for you to check manually.




You can set the **Primary Language** here and **Title** if prompted.



Alternate Text can be set here for your images as well as marking an image as decorative.






Reading Order

Tagging your document for accessibility

- With the reading order tool you can highlight and tag elements in your document.
- The reading order shows you how the document will be read to screen readers.
- You will be able to edit the reading order of your document in the reading order tab in the tools pane.





Panels

- Content Panel: The Content Panel shows the internal structure of the PDF, displaying individual elements like text, images, and objects in a hierarchical format.
- Order Panel: The Order Panel displays the sequence in which text, images, tables, and other elements are read by screen readers.
- Accessibility Tags Panel: The
 Accessibility Tags Panel is a tool that
 provides a detailed view of the tags
 structure in a PDF, which is critical for
 ensuring the document's accessibility.
 Tags in a PDF serve as labels or
 markers.

Images and Alt-Text

- It is important to add alternative text to images in the document so that they can be read by a screen reader.
- Make it brief and descriptive.
- Images are tagged as "Figure"
- Does it add to the narrative of the content?
- Decorative images can be tagged as "Background/Artifact"

PDF Accessibility Tips

Making a PDF accessible can be difficult, tedious and complex

- Always save your PDF as you go, Acrobat can become unstable when editing
- If content disappears, change the reading order or arrange the order in "Edit PDF"
- Remove empty tags
- Use a common font
